### **Aristides' Apology and the Novel Barlaam and Ioasaph**

Feb 09 2021 This study explores the so-called 'Apology of Aristides' as it can be found within Barlaam and Ioasaph (B & I). Scholars have started from the hypothesis (when comparing the Greek B & I version to the Syriac version) that the redactor of B & I has removed details from within the 'Apology'. Although this has a prima facie probability, no scholar has addressed whether this one hundred year old hypothesis holds any truth. In order to understand a text within a framing text, one needs to get a clear idea of the latter, especially its textual form and its core ideas. This allows an insight into the relationship between the two entities. I ask which elements of the 'Apology' entered B & I and have been seen as fitting this framework, which of the linguistic entities and theological ideas are consistent with both the time and content of B & I, and how the 'Apology' reads as part of the overall narrative of the B & I. I explore the role played by this 'added' text in B & I, and why the author or redactor may have chosen to use it. Furthermore, is this text the only fragment that was added to B & I? Once the 'text' of the 'Apology' is understood in its frame, I argue, can we examine how that frame may have impacted on the interpretation of the 'Apology', and whether and to

what extent it may have impacted on the text itself. This answer to the latter question may already have been suggested when looking at how the linguistic entities fit the B & I frame. Finally, I compare the 'Apology' of the B & I with the older Greek papyri of the 'Apology'. A study such as this has never been accomplished, and yet such a study proves essential in understanding the Greek version of the 'Apology', as it appears in B & I, and how this new information relates to the other versions of the 'Apology'. What we discover is that the redactor has not changed much of the B & I version of the 'Apology' contrary to what previous scholarship suggests.

### **The Rationale for Aniconism in the Old Testament**

Jul 02 2020 "Why does the Old Testament reject idolatry?" is a question that might be asked by both academics and others. Although many people may be satisfied with a simple answer, the scholarly community continues to grapple with this question. Scholarly works have looked at Israelite aniconism (the rejection of idolatry) using evolutionary, sociological and theological approaches, but they have not paid much attention to explaining its rationale in the Old Testament (OT). The present work fills this gap by examining selected OT texts. The thesis of this work is that the OT rejects idolatry because of the incompatibility between the aniconic deity (Yahweh) and "idol" on the one hand and between the status of Israel and "idol" on the other hand. Here the word "idol" is used for something that is intended to represent Yahweh and/or other gods in the religions of Ancient West Asia (AWA).

### **Apuleius and the Metamorphosis of Platonism**

Dec 07 2020 Apuleius was a respected philosopher Platonicus in Late Antiquity and the Middle Ages. Until the middle of last century, he attracted the attention of scholars as a so-called 'Middle Platonist' author. Then, with the rejection of the historical schema that he had been

situated in (the so-called 'school of Gaius', which we will treat shortly), his 'brother' Alcinous was the object of studies and (even harsh) criticisms, while almost nothing more was written about Apuleius by anyone. Studies of Middle Platonism primarily accentuated the liberty of the philosophers of the 1st and 2nd centuries AD, who interpreted the doctrines of Plato without constituting a specific school. Due to this new vision of Middle Platonism, Apuleius' role was difficult to define. It is not uncommon to find that Apuleius the philosopher is completely neglected. The literary character, and especially the 'rhetorical' nature of some of his works and of his personality have probably hurt his reputation in philosophy. These aspects of his personality have however been ever more accentuated in the last few decades within the development of studies on Second Sophistics. Consequently not only have there been few scholars to show interest for Apuleius' philosophical doctrines, but those few who have the opportunity to almost manage his philosophical doctrines usually disregard his literary works. In this way one cannot understand the most specific aspect of his philosophy, which consists in a sort of intermingling of philosophy and literature (a typical attitude of Greek and Latin culture of the 2nd century AD), and above all, of religion and Platonism. The dichotomy between philosophy and literature that was normal in the 19th and 20th centuries

therefore still persists in the case of Apuleius. Claudio Moreschini attempted in some way to fill this gap in his 1978 study on Apuleio e il Platonismo. It was obviously in vain. Accordingly, in this book he would like to reflect on the possibility of a synthesis between these two aspects.
